

WHITE TO PLAY AND WIN (solution elsewhere in this issue)

ORANGE--Morton Delman has announced the "Orange No-Smoking Open" on January 28-29. See letter from him elsewhere in this issue containing all details. We are pleased to see more organized activity coming to that part of the State.

NAVASOTA--Following the erroneous, fragmented information in the last issue, we received reports about the Grimes County Open held on September 24-25 from both Organizer John Garcia, Jr. and TD Harmon D. Throneberry. Roger R. Smith, the London master doing a tour at Texas A & M won the event with 42-2. Art Riley of San Antonio and Steve Lynn of Austin scored 4-1 to tie for second place. Riley won the top Class A on tie-break and Lynn was awarded Class B honors. Tiberiu Muntean of Houston and Gary West of San Antonio tied for the top C prizes, with Muntean getting the trophy. John Garcia, Jr. of Navasota captured the top D/E trophy and Solek Shrekenhamer of College Station won the top unrated trophy. James Foye of College Station was the top junior and won a book donated by Stoneage Products(you guys like to place an ad??-ed.). A total of 21 players participated.

COLLEGE STATION - Brazos Open this year and the first prize of \$100 were won by Eugene Kohnitz of San Antonio before two masters and several other players above his rating. Another great positive surprise was the share of the second prize by Edward Guetzow, freshman at the Texas A&M University, whose rating before the tournament was 1584. He shared this prize with Ronald Henley, however Henley had a higher tie-breaking score. The class prizes were distributed to the groups of 5 players each, ranked by their rating. Expert and A class prize was shared by R. Smith (2310) and J. Stamm, B prize was taken by Rod Broeker, other B prize by S. Shrekenhamer, C-D-unr. was taken by Guetzow in the share with the second prize. Each class prize was \$20, second prize was \$30. We are planning the next tournament in April. The cross table is elsewhere in this issue. TD was Dr. Dusan Djuric.


WICHITA FALLS -- TK editor Tom Cunningham scored 5-0 to win the Red River Open held November 19-20. Second place was won by James V. Rohrbaugh of Wichita Falls who scored 4-1. losing only to Cunningham. Jeff Baffo of Wichita Falls and Wallace Brady of Fort Worth each scored 3-2 to tie for third place. Fourteen players entered the event, but only about 10 finished. Several area players entered the event to show their support of the efforts of the Wichita Falls Chess Club even knowing in advance that they would not be able to play all five rounds. The event was ably directed by Charles E. Davis, assisted when needed by John L. Chapman. The tournament could have been hurt but fortunately wasn't by another organizer in the area who cleared another event on the same day by taking advantage of the fact that Art Riley didn't know Archer City was a suburb of Wichita Falls. The competing event never began. We hope that the efforts of Mr. Davis and the Wichita Falls Chess Club will be noticed and that their next event will be even more successful.

- DALLAS -- Mrs. Jan Stephens, an eighth-grade teacher at Forest Meadows Junior High School has taken it upon herself to do what local organizers have not done for many, many years. On December 3. five Richardson ISD junior high schools each sent teams of 10 players to Forest Meadows to play in a team championship. The event was conducted as a 5-round Swiss Event in which no players from the same school were ever paired together. Forest Meadows won the team trophy with a score of 32-18, followed by Westwood Junior High 292-202, West Junior High 242-252, Richardson Junior High 213-283, and Liberty Junior High 183-313. Top three individual honors were won by Eric Cooke of West who scored 5-0, Christopher McConnel of West who scored 42-2, and Lucky Tonroy of Forest Meadows who won a playoff between six players scoring 4-1. The other three RISD junior highs were invited but could not field teams. Mrs. Stephens and the faculty sponsors of chess teams in the other four schools are to be commended for their efforts above the call of duty. TK editor Tom Cunningham helped to direct the 49-player event.
- IRVING(DALLAS) -- We are told that the Texas Open was won by John Hall, Jr. and Gary Hewitt, each of whom scored 42-12. To date, we have received no report from organizer Callaway or TD Snead.
- SAN ANTONIO--The 1978 Southwest Open will again be held in San Antonio. The locals are currently hopeful that they can arrange for the participation of CHESS 4.6, perhaps the strongest chessplaying computer program in the USA.
- WICHITA FALLS--The recently concluded Wichita Falls City Championship was won by the WFCC president, Dr. Walter Stapp, who commutes 75 miles each way each week from Crowell. Dr. Stapp scored 6½-½, and was followed by James V. Rohrbaugh 5½-1½, Fred Kidwell and John L. Chapman 4½-2½, Dwight Stafford, Maurice Allred at 4-3. A total of 14 players participated in the event which was played between September 12 and November 14.

COLLEGE STATION - You missed it! We had a great little speed tournament on 15 October, but most of you did not come. In 16 rounds (4-fold round robin) Billy Patteson (1950) took the first prize with 13 points and Ronald Goad (1750) the second with  $11\frac{1}{2}$  points. The others were Foye (1612, age 15) 8, Djurić (1676)  $6\frac{1}{2}$  and Miller (1800) 1. Watch out for the next tournament in the excellent facilities of the Texas A&M University!

- AMARILLO--President Snead reports that a local club meets each

After about 7 moves while I was walking around, some player asked me if I didn't know that Hall had written a book on this opening. My reply was: "Yes, I know it, but maybe I don't care!" For about 10 years, this has been my stock opening in games against strong players where I don't want to lose. My results have been surprisingly excellent with it. I don't play it against lower rated players or when I must win because I believe White's winning chances are less than and slower than 1 e4! Going into the final round, both Hall and I had 4-0, and only Kelly Clover had 32-2. Clover lost to James Musemuci, so John Hall and I tied for 1st at 42-2, each winning \$150. Had either of us lost, we would have received almost nothing even with a 4-1 score. Yes, I believe I had attained a slight edge as White at the 26th move, but do you really expect me to risk \$150 against an additional \$25 by trying to beat Hall in the ending??

We have not yet received the full report and crosstable and hopefully some other games from Charence Callaway, Jr., the organizer of the 57-player Lone Star Open, but we hope to have in time for the next issue.

During the week preceding the LSO, Bob Lutz of Ft. Worth who had announced his Summer Open in CI&R for the same weekend(July 30-31) voluntarily cancelled his event and encouraged players to attend the LSO in Irving. Callaway claims that he cleared the date because he was the USCF clearing house when he began to organize the event.

- (a) 7e5 offers good chances of maintaining the initiative.
- (b) Threatening 13 e5 and 14 e6 with some attacking chances
- (c) Now 13e5? is answered by ...de5 14 fe5 ne5! winning a pawn Also, if 13 Qd3 Qc7 14 e5? de5 15fe5 Ne5! 16 Re5 Qe5 and wins
- (d) A typical sacrifice, but they are never easy to play
- (e) Not 15...Nc3 16 Qf3 regaining a pawn with the better game
- (f) 19...Qb5 threatens 20...Qb2 winning more queenside pawns
- (g) Now 20...Qb2? is met with 21 Qc1
- (h) What else is there? The text is probably the best practical chance
- (i) Best here is 26...Nc3! 27 Rc3 Bd4 28 Rc4 dc4 and black wins, as demonstrated by Larry Englebretson.
- (j)Gulp! In mutual time pressure, I suddenly noticed that either capture of the rook would allow 30 Qb8 ch and mate.
- (k) The refutation because 29 Qf4 e5! and Black still hangs on to win
- (1) Not 33...Qg6?? 34 Qf8ch Qg8 35 Nf7mate.
- (m) Hemming the king and mate is inevitable. For example, 38 Bg1 Ra1 39 Nc5 e3 40 Nd3 e4 41 Nb4 Rg1ch 42 Kg1 e2 wins.
