FIDE master Joe Bradford of Austin won the 1987 Texas State Championship held in Austin over the Memorial Day weekend. Bradford scored 5½ to take clear first, the only blemish being a last-round draw with No. 2-rated John Dunning of Dallas.

GAME/30: "ACTIVE CHESS" OR A WASTE OF TIME?

FIDE recently announced that it will start a new championship cycle, featuring the new Game/30 time control (also known as "active chess" and "sudden death").

This move, which allows tournament organizers to be

absolutely certain how long a game will last, and is supposed to increase part-time participation and television/spectator coverage.

While applauding a move that can help bring more people into chess, I question the procedure that FIDE (and USCF, which is enthusiastically embracing the new time control) used to implement it.

The faster time control must favor a particular type of player; the question is, what type? A player from Lubbock who was rated about 2000 moved to the southeast, where he played in a couple of Game/30 tournaments and cleaned up. He knocked 3 or 4 Masters, and several Experts. He says that his rating is rapidly approaching the Master level.

Meanwhile, a local 1900 player played in a club Game/30 tournament and lost to two players who were a combined total of about 500 points lower than him, and was lucky to draw a third who was rated 200 points lower.

What's the answer? <u>A separate rating</u>. One that won't blow a player's

hard-earned rating points -points that he might have worked 5 or 6 hours in one game to have --in a halfhour.

There's a separate rating for postal players. Why not have one for Game/30? Let those who want to play quicker chess play it; but don't punish those who don't want to.

The USCF Policy Board has already discussed the matter. The thought has crossed their minds. However, they need your opinion on the matter. Let them hear your side of things.

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



Boy, Clarence Calloway and Bill Snead really know how to put on a tournament! The annual 4th of July bash in Irving was a classy event. Although the playing site was on the 12th (top) floor of the Ramada Inn and could have stood better lighting and more airconditioning, in every other respect it was superb.

Clarence (organizer) and Bill (director) have a synergism that probably comes from their years of friendship.

The rounds started on time consistently, almost no noticeable problems or pairings protests arose. and a welcome silence reigned throughout the tournament. I had heard many good things about the event but it has to be experienced.

As a first-time participant, it seemed like old home week to me. Headed by the perennial favorites John Dunning and Ken Smith, a full 111 players entered the 1987 event. Even though they weren't playing it was a treat to see many of the old stalwarts drop by. Among these were Olin Chism, John Hall, Curtis Lucas, Bob Mapes, Jerry Milburn, and Sol Schwartz.

As the 4th fell on Saturday, a very nice 3-day, 6-round Swiss was possible. From the turnout, this evidently agreed with most folks' schedules; the same format is planned for 1988. Enough of the social

amenities. Three Masters and eleven Experts comprised the top of the entry list. The first round gave 1700's a shot at the Master: After the 2nd round only three of the top 20 were absent from the 2-point group. However, in Round 3, Dunning was held to a hard-fought draw by Kay Hale (1966) and Smith was likewise drawn by David Leinbach:


The beginning of Round 5 saw the perfect scores cut to 3 -- myself, Tom Dropka. and Josh Turin. Turin, having played a nice Rook sac to defeat Robert Weinberg, had his work cut out for him in the 5th round: Black against John (Predator) Dunning. But in a replay of the old folk tale. Josh and the Beanstalk, Mr. Turin lost the opening and middlegame decisively, won the early endgame, wretchedly lost two pawns with his flag hanging, and shrewdly finagled Dunning into falling on his sword. Now, would you say that the

final outcome -- a draw -was equitable?

Meanwhile Simms had gotten the drop on Dropka and emerged as the sole 5-point going into the last round.

Of course, the obvious move works! (Did you think not?) 1 d7, Be8! Now 2 dxe8/Q would stalemate. Since Chessmaster 2000 has not learned how to underpromote, it plays 2 Bf1, Bxd7ch; "Game drawn due to insufficient material."

Fidelity Elite on the highest level plays 2 dxe8/B?? which is Crazy! It has been programmed to think that a Bishop is always preferable to a Knight. Wrong, Wrong, 4 cd Nxd5 5 Nc3 Nb6 6 Nf3 Nc6 Wrong! Now, the classic matchup: Ken Smith, the old Master and reputed possessor of psychic phenomena, against the naive youngster Simms, eager to learn the arcane mysteries of the art Smith, at 43, needs to win to take home the marbles. Simms needs to draw with Black to assure at least a tie for first.

The game starts out as a nightmare for Simms. How can Smith almost effort. lessly roll to a crushing advantage in the opening?

moment of truth Simms refuses to give up a crucial center pawn, sacrificing the exchange instead. For this he received the two Bishops, a centralized Knight, and seriously weakened Smith's K-side. After maneuvering for some time, Smith returned the exchange and offered the draw which gave Simms the title.
