

Touch and Move! by WCM Claudia Muñoz

It was only a one hour trip by land from Del Rio, Texas to a small Mexican town called Zaragoza in the state of Coahuila in Northern Mexico but it was an impacting journey for me. I received a Facebook message about six weeks ago from a chess organizer in Zaragoza who invited me to play in his tournament. He explained that the city tourism department had backed him all year long into hosting five chess tournaments in his town, they were going to host the sixth and last one of the year so he was inviting me to participate on November 21. After thinking about it, I decided to participate since it was only one hour by land from the U.S. Border. I knew I was being invited because I am Hispanic and I have a large social media following from Mexico among my followers.



When I announced to my 7,000 plus followers in Facebook and 3,000 followers in Twitter that I would be attending the '6th Chess Open' in Zaragoza, the organizer told me that they received numerous messages asking about the event.



Zaragoza is In the middle of nowhere, an hour away from the Mexican cities of Acuña and Piedras Negras each with 100,000 in population. However no one really needs to travel to this small town to play chess – but it happened as 40 players showed up to the event including International Master Florentino Garmendez and his brother FIDE Master Carlos Garmendez both from Monterrey, Mexico (a four hour drive). In addition the tournament did not have a prize fund and even in those conditions three of us who had FIDE titles and over 50% of the participants came from other cities to this small town to play chess - simply incredible.

When my father and I arrived at the Zaragoza Cultural Center, a representative from the Zaragoza Tourism Office along with Paul Alejandro (the chess organizer) where at the entrance to welcome us. On the wall there was an enormous sign with my name welcoming me as their special guest to the event. Under the sign they posted a wall display in Spanish with my entire chess history along with pictures.

I was overwhelmed!

As the tournament hall filled, the local town Mayor arrived to welcome the players in a short but sweet opening ceremony. He gave us a brief account of the history of Zaragoza. I was asked to sit on board 1 so that the Mayor could go ahead and make the ceremonial first chess move. Once this happened the tournament started!



We played a total of five rounds at a G/45 sudden death time control, which was a new experience for me. Also not many people have official ratings in Mexico so one has to be extremely cautious and not carry our "rating mentality". I won my first, third, fourth and fifth round games but I lost the second round to Baldemar Herrera Murillo who had a low rating but lots of experience. Actually I had faced him in another tournament in Coahuila in April (I try to play in at least two chess tournaments in Mexico per year) and I barely won that time.

Since there was no prize fund and this was an unrated event – the threat of cheating was non-existent! Each game for me was hard fought, nothing was easy as several players were easily at EXPERT strength back home.

I would unequivocally participate in this event again as the people were so warm and friendly as well as talkative. They had so many questions about U.S. Chess as well as Texas chess tournaments and I could see in their eyes that they were proud of me as an American of Mexican Heritage.

Coach's Corner - e4! by Robert L. Myers - The 7 Deadly Sins of Chess

One of my students asked me, "Coach, what are the seven deadly sins?" Well, being the academician I am and impressed that he asked me instead of Google, I obliged. The seven deadly sins as viewed by society and literature are: lust, gluttony, greed, sloth, wrath, envy, and pride. Lust to have an intense desire or need. Gluttony - excess in eating and drinking. Greed excessive or reprehensible acquisitiveness. Laziness - disinclined to activity or exertion: not energetic or vigorous. Wrath strong vengeful anger or indignation. Envy - painful or resentful awareness of an advantage enjoyed by another joined with a desire to possess the same advantage. Pride - quality or state of being proud inordinate self esteem.



After that brief conversation that quickly turned religious, this got me to thinking, there are a few things in chess one should never do. Then there are a few things in chess one should always do. Could there really be seven deadly sins in chess as I mentioned in an earlier issue of Texas Knights? If so what are they? After talking with a few Grand Master friends, GM Gareyev, GM Julio Sadorra, and the most recent winner of Millionaire Open 2, GM Hikaru Nakamura, IM James Rousselle, Expert Robert Rasmussen and GM Irina Krush, through various conversations with these wonderful people, we came up with a combination of things solid chess players should and should not do, The 7 Deadly Sins of Chess.



In no particular order:

- 1. Every move must have purpose.
- 2. Don't over task your pieces.
- 3. Protect every piece, and anticipate an attack
- 4. When ahead trade.
- 5. When behind, protect.
- 6. Multi-purpose your pieces
- 7. A. B. C. A-lways B-e Looking for C-heckmate.

Check mate from my opponent and check mate against my opponent.

Chess is time and space. Every move must have purpose. If a player carelessly moves pieces without purpose he will lose "tempo." To put it mildly, "That ain't good." Every move must be calculated to the degree that each subsequent move will work in conjunction with each previous move. Vinnie said to Josh Waitzkin's mom in the Searching for Bobby Fischer movie, "Lady your boy used pieces in combination to attack. Thus, every move must have purpose.

Have you ever had more things to do than you could ever possibly get done? Don't over task your pieces. This is when you are attempting to have , let's say a Rook, cover four pieces all at the same time. Not only is that impractical to do, it is also impossible. A Rook and a Queen may possibly do such a difficult task as they are more versatile. However; even a Queen can only do so much. She can Do almost anything but no self respecting gentleman should allow her to do so. Yes, I'm talking about chess.



Chess pieces are not a part of your body but should be treated as valuable property especially if you are down on material. So, protect every piece, and anticipate an attack. When you do this you will be



ahead, mentally of calculating what pieces are not protected and the options to consider to do so. If an attack is coming you will see it in time and save an extra tempo or time.

"But why did you trade," asked one of my middle school students. My response was elementary. Let's say we are in a battle and I have 100 guys and you have 50 guys, I can trade 50 of my guys for 50 of your guys and I will still have 50 guys and myself. You will only have yourself remaining. That's a simple calculation, when ahead trade and anticipate an attack because your opponent will want to equalize the material advantage. This is the same principle of being behind in material. You will want to recapture every single time unless you can calculate Check-Mate first, which brings us to our final two of the 7 Deadly Sins of Chess. Multi-purpose your pieces and "Always be looking for checkmate."

Attempting to explain this principle to a high school student I asked, "Can you clean your room at home?" "Can you do your homework?" "Can you go to the theatre?" "Now can you do those things all at the same time?" His answer of course was, "No". This student asked me to try and simplify the principle of "Over-taxing" and the process of multi-purposing your pieces. Some pieces can do more than others. Those pieces that can, should. Those pieces that can't, shouldn't.



We were invited to New Orleans by our CAJUN friends for a "friendly game" of chess. So, we rallied 18 students, travelled across the 22 mile Atchafalaya Basin Bridge to what they termed The Louisiana vs. Texas Bayou Beat Down the day after the NOLA, New Orleans, LA, 2015 Chess Fest, very well organized by Michael Tisserand. The seven-time American Champion GM Irina Krush and Master Michael Rassmusen were there along with everything you could image for chess lovers. It is truly a chess player's paradise. In a lecture at the beautiful Tulane University Campus just hours before our tournament players rated 1400 and above were invited to an exclusive lecture by GM Krush, right before our tournament where

she talked about the single most important thing in chess which is our final deadly sin. Always look for checkmate. GM Krush said in a lecture using a smart board, "This game wasn't going to well for me and then it came to that I don't have checkmate but my opponent, who was having a standout tournament, didn't have checkmate either but I was up a tempo and I had a better position. So I looked for it and it was there in 5 forced moves, checkmate. The younger students I coach have a cute little acronym they like to sing, "A. B. C., A-lways B-elieve C-oach." My mom, would say, "Always bring cash." Actually in this game we love, although not grammatically correct, it's easier to remember A- Iways, Be - looking for Checkmate. That's check mate from my opponent and check mate against my opponent. It is the only way to win or lose.


