Texas Grades: a TD perspective

Luis was wondering if I could help out in the state grade championships to be held in Houston. I had always attended these tournaments for several years now. This is the only tournament that had a parent-child event, which my sons and I had played in for several years. I had fond memories of playing in those tourneys. But my sons had grown older and were not going to play this year, so I was not planning to attend. The fact that a parent and a child were competing gave it a special meaning to my sons and me. Why don't more parents play?

Of course I could not say no to Luis, and promised that I will be there. I was given the High school/College section. Each section has its advantages (and disadvantages). Being a TD in this section meant you do not have to crisscross the ballroom with hundreds of hands going up. However, from experience I knew that at least a few games would last the full time frame. Then I looked at the flyer. One thing caught my eye "All rounds are game in 90 minutes with 30 second increment"

I tried to comprehend that I had not directed a tournament with that time control in the past. Ninety minutes with 30-second increments. Apparently this is a new

norm getting acceptance in the tournament world. I had seen several endgame blitzes where players could make several moves even with couple of seconds left in their decrementing clocks. I had nightmares that two players could play on forever with an infinitely increasing clock. Little did it help to know that even in the last five minutes, you still had to notate. As one could notate and still has a lot of time left to add to the AT&T's unused minutes, to be carried over until I became ninety years old. Yeah, that is going to happen!! There are more than ten GM, or NM, or FM rated players. They will be playing all day and night. Can I back out, Luis?

It was with a little apprehension that I saw Luis on Saturday morning. The first good thing was he had ten digital clocks with the increment feature. He showed me how to use them. The good old faithful Chronos had always had this feature to be set up. Even though a player may play without a clock at all, they cannot use a different time control. This made several clocks that you see around obsolete, as they did not have the increment feature. I was able to give a clock to every game. This sure helped in the timing process. Contrary to my worst fears, the games took no longer than four hours. An average game is about 60 moves. So with the time control we had

Chess Teaches Grammar?

I never guessed that chess could help build language skills. Math? Sure. But language? Apparently, it does – at least in German.

This summer instead of going on holidays, a group of researchers from the University of Trier in Rhineland-Palatinate, studied the experimental introduction of chess in elementary school for the new academic year.

The results show that six-year-old children that have begun to learn chess learn not only math but also German grammar more easily. In other words, researchers proved that children who play chess are doing better during all the years of the primary school.

For this reason chess is now considered an established educational method in Germany's primary schools.

Chess helps children develop logic and represents a great workout for their brain; chess can also be useful to facilitate the integration of foreign scholars (more than eight million students in Germany are immigrants or children of immigrants).

This new method of using chess to improve students' performances in traditional disciplines like grammar and math is now used in all primary schools in Germany.

The biggest problem for the teachers was when children learned how to play chess and started to beat them. We must say that this is clear evidence of how the pupils can overcome their masters. For this reason, teachers are now assisted by regular chess players during the "chess hours".

Whether you live in Germany or not, scientific evidence shows that chess is a great educational game and can help children to develop not only math capabilities, but also grammar and literacy skills.

Pan-Am in South Padre: UMBC wins with perfect score

The University of Maryland Baltimore County won clear first at the Pan-American Intercollegiate Championships, held Dec. 27-30 in South Padre Island, Texas. The team earned a perfect 6-0 score, dominating what was expected to be a tight competition. They defeated the only other teams with an average over 2500, University of Texas at Dallas and University of Texas at Brownsville. Last year they tied for first with University of Texas at Dallas's "B" team, but lost out on tiebreak.

Members of the winning squad were GMs Leonid Kritz and Sergey Erenburg, IM Giorgi Magedvelashvili, IM Sasha Kaplan and WGM Sabina-Francesca Foisor.

In Rd. 4 UMBC clashed with perennial rival UTD-A Dallas' Alejandro Ramirez and Marko Zivanic were unable to win with White, and Daniel Ludwig and Wang Puchen went down with Black, for a 3-1 UMBC win.

Tied for 2nd-4th were University of Texas at Dallas's A and B teams and Texas Tech University, with 4.5/6 each. This will mark Tech's first entry to the Final Four.

UT-Brownsville will not be returning to the Final Four, having finished in a tie for 5th-7th with UMBC-B and UTB-B. Before the event their top board, GM Timur Gareev, mused: "We need cheerleaders! Soccer players have cheerleaders," (reported by WIM Luciana Morales in *Chess Life Online*.)

There were 118 players representing 28 teams, from as far as away Stanford, the University of Toronto and the University of the West Indies in Barbados.

The University of Texas at Brownsville hosted the event at the Sheraton-South Padre Island.

it was three hours plus 60 moves on the average. A players clock can increment only 30 minutes in sixty moves, giving a total of four hours. It sure was an experience.

I would recommend this time control only to seasoned players. Make sure that you have enough clocks to use for all your players. Even though theoretically the game can never end, it will. I still had a lot of time left doing nothing, as I ran out of sudoku and crosswords.

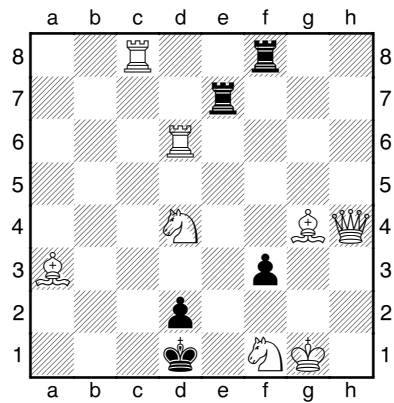
