## Tarrant Holds Down Waco 14.5 to 11.5



Hillsboro, Texas (7 October 2017). In BRAZOS II, the Tarrant Chess Team, captained by Adam Hart, fell behind early and quickly trailed 4-0. Chief Tournament Director Jim Hollingsworth, pulling double duty as a Tarrant player, halted the slide by forcing a draw with Waco chess icon Carmen Chairez. The Tarrant players found their momentum and surged to an 8-5 halftime lead. In the second half, Tarrant never trailed and continued building

its lead for a 14.5 to 11.5 final score.

The Honorable Edith Turner Omberg, Mayor of the City of Hillsboro, Texas, officiated the opening ceremonies at Hill College. She was accompanied by Chelsea Adamson and Xavier Cook, Chamber of Commerce Representatives, and together they inspired both teams to greatness. The players received several gifts as



mementoes including a commemorative edition of "The Reporter." At the Victory Dinner she presented the new BRAZOS trophy to Adam Hart, Tarrant Chess Team Captain (the photo shows Chief Tournament Director Jim Hollingsworth on the left, Mayor Omberg in the center, and Adam Hart on the right).







## Coach's Corner - e4!

### Make Good Moves ON and OFF the Board

Dream big, work hard/smart, stay humble... Life is a gift, and it offers us the privilege, opportunity, and responsibility to give something back by becoming more." - Tony Robbins. Now that's pretty good but my favorite quote of 2017 is from The film The Last Jedi and the Master of ALL Masters. "The greatest teacher, failure is. We are what they (Padawan learners, students) grow beyond. That is the true burden of all Masters." - Master Yoda. With those statements in mind believe me when I say I was really crushed. I was convinced I needed to resign from coaching Chess. Here's the thing, we had won every single chess tournament that we ever entered. I loved coaching my kids. The comradery, the closeness --- we were like family. If someone were ill, all 117 of us would sign get well cards, purchase flowers and go visit. We were truly family. That is one of the myriad of components that propagated our success. It's because chess is an interactive, mind expanding tool for teaching people how to think critically, analyze deeply, and solve problems effectively. It has been used for over 1,500 years all around the world by kings and queens, athletes, entertainers, philosophers, politicians, by parents and teachers to better train and develop the human mind to reach its maximum potential. It has been used by schools in over 30 countries to help teach effective decision-making, foster self-esteem, enhance concentration and promote academic success. Chess is a Rubik's Cube, wrapped in an enigma, confounded in a puzzle, a maze, riddled with queries unanswered. I felt that I should resign not because of our failures but because of our many successes. With 31 National and State Championships and titles in just 15 years the difficulty of recruiting new players, conflicts with scheduling, and the never-ending treadmill of fundraising was becoming more than laborious.

But when "Your passion is your work you'll never have to work," at least not as hard.

When we started travelling on our overseas chess tours the pressure of fund-raising nearly tripled. In less than 45 days of this printing we will travel to Japan, Land of the Rising Sun, we are taking an expertly guided tour of Imperial Palace Plaza; interacting the bustle of Tokyo's streets, a visit to the Meiji Shrine, visit Asakusa Kannon Temple, Buddhist temple, learn about sumo wrestling, see the Great Buddha, view Mount Fuji, cruise on sparkling Lake Ashi, ride a cable car up Mount Komagatake, travel by bullet train to Kyoto, view the cherry blossom trees, visit Imperial Japan, see a Zen Buddhist temple, check out a kimono show at the Textile Center, visit more shrines and temples, and the incredible Bamboo Forest. Then, this summer we return to Italy and Greece, check out the Roman Forum, along with Vatican City, the Sistine Chapel, the Colosseum, the Acropolis in Athens, the Duomo in Florence, the Temple of Zeus and much more await. Plus we will kick some butt in chess

while there too. My zeal and zest for the game of chess combined with travel and what those two do for kids is at an all time high. "Traveling; it leaves you speechless, then turns you into a storyteller". – Ibn Battuta. I shall always remember standing inside the London Eye in England near the crest of its zenith. One of my students, a basketball player and private chess student for 5 years now, was near tears looking at the Thames River towards Westminster Abbey. I asked him, "Are you alright?" He replied, "Yes Sir Coach. I'm fine. I'm in England." I smiled and nodded. He continued with a huge smile through tears and shouted, "And I'll be in Paris tomorrow!!!"

It is amazing to me how much stuff Curious George gets himself into while traveling. I'm also amazed at how neatly the scriptures line up with chess. Almost everything we do in chess has a Biblical principle, deception, treachery, analytical thinking, honesty, purity, determination, discipline and dedication along with lots of travel as well. They walked everywhere back then. Our last day in Rome last year I walked over 22k steps and only 900 the day after we returned home. I was chatting with my Pastor and friend Jay Duane Driver of Fresh Fire Ministries and my best friend J. Larry Morris years ago when they could beat me at chess (insert big smile here) these are guys who empower me and make me a better person, one should always sur-

round themselves with better people than we are, I digress, anyway we all concurred that life is a choice just as chess is a choice and it should help you make better decisions. I have written several articles that are sextants for chess and daily living. In one of my contributions I write "...what is chess, OPTIONS. National Chess Master and certified authority on Bobby Fischer, Master Bruce Pandolfini, in his book Every Move Must Have Purpose, Strategies for Business and Life, instructs us that life must have options and purpose. Magnus Carlsen, the number #1 ranked chess player in the world says, "I believe I can beat anybody, anywhere at anytime." That's because he gives himself options but constricts his opponents of those very same options.

One of my writing mentors, a superior educator, Sheila Lane, says, "Coach as I read your articles I'm learning that chess mirrors life. You write about life." I'm not entirely sure I disagree. Chess is life, I believe likewise it is a chart of sorts for better focus and understanding of one's self. I'm blessed and honored to have incredible people in my life like Cedric O. Johnson a very guided focused and disciplined husband, father and business owner, Billy D. Washington an incredibly intelligent comedian, musician and wonderful person. You can catch Billy on of the many Carnival Cruise ships. He is usually the smartest guy in the room. Keeping him in my life is a good move. While I'm at it, let me drop a few more names (wink, wink) Grand Masters, Timur Gareyev, Maurice Ashley, Master Rene Phillips, longtime friend Marcia Buck and too many others to mention. These amazing persons unknowingly keep me grounded which in turn grounds my players. I've met too many great persons in my travels and I'm definitively convinced and convicted that having these persons in my life are good choices --- pardon my metaphors but choices/options are like compasses. Keeping wonderful persons in your life is like castling your King to safety without it you could possibly lose. When you play chess keep in mind these 10 things, they seem to make good sense to me.

1. Look at how far you've grown and learned as a chess player instead of how far you still need to go. If you keep learning you will eventually get to where you want to be.
2. You can never carry enough rocks to toss at every dog that barks. That isolated pawn on the 7th rank isn't important enough to capture and risk losing the entire game. Some things aren't worth the effort.
3. Comparing yourself to other chess players isn't worth your time.
4. You've lost games before and it only made you stronger if you learned from those losses. Every challenge makes you stronger.
5. Play with passion but not with emotion. Losing a major piece isn't the end of the game. Making better moves means making better choices.
6. Making mistakes is a part of life so don't fear making the wrong move, always try anyway and fear will disappear. Always choose the choice that

gives you more options and never leave the board doubting yourself with the questions of "What could have happened if...?"

7. Remember that you are not alone. There are other players, books, articles, videos and movies that can help you to become a better player. All you have to do is find them.
8. You're human, you will make mistakes. Chess is almost perfect but humans aren't. Sometimes we take important things for granted.
9. Helping others is great therapy. Teach what you've been taught. This will reinforce what you know work's in chess and in life.
10. Never give up. No explanation needed.

These tips show us where we are and where we should go and what not to do. As Pastor Joel Osteen says, "It's a choice." I've learned a myriad of things from the Bible and Curious George. Things I should and should not do. That monkey gets into all sorts of trouble with poor choices. These are good moves on and off the board. Now shake hands and start your clocks and choose wisely.






